All Saints Church

Dear Friends,

I am sure that many of us might have found January a long and difficult month. We had to take the tough decision to close the church again for worship services after our Christmas service. I know that some people were disappointed and really look forward to meeting in church, but we have to keep everyone safe at this time.

On Ash Wednesday - 17th February this year, Christians mark the start of Lent - normally with a service in church, but this year we are online.

Lent is traditionally a season of 40 days of penitence and fasting. I don't know how you feel about Lent this year, but I feel as though I have done nothing but give things up for the past year. I've given up hugs, holidays, dinners with friends, weddings, christenings, singing, Christmas with my family: I could go on, but I don't need to. Because you all know exactly what I mean.

The idea of giving anything else up just makes me want to weep- or spit feathers- maybe both...... **BUT** if we think of Lent as a time when we turn away from the things that distract us from God's love; and turn towards the things that reconnect us with God's love, that might be more helpful.

Here are some things which might help you to do that:

GET OUT...

Spend time outside every day if you can- even if it's just a few minutes- and jot down in a notebook or journal what you see, and what you are thankful for. For me, as I hear a bit more birdsong, and see a few more green leaves, and watch the early shoots of bulbs popping up, there is a real gladness in the coming of Spring. I am reminded of God's goodness and my own part in creation and it lifts my spirits.

GET WRITING...

You might want to get in some writing paper and go through your address book- try writing a letter or an email every day to someone you care about- maybe somebody you haven't been in touch with for a while- thank them for their part in your life as a friend or neighbour. Pray for them.

GET A BIT OF PEACE AND QUIET...

If you are not already in the habit of praying, try this: After you've had your breakfast each day, find a quiet spot, light a candle, and just spend five minutes quietly. It doesn't have to be complicated. Ask God to be with you through the day. Ask for God's help in knowing His presence. Ask for peace in your heart as you begin the day. Say the Lord's prayer.

This Lent, be kind to yourself, take things gently, remember that God's love is all around you. And whatever you do, don't give up.

Woodchurch Surgery - January 30th Update

I'm sorry for providing a slightly late weekly update in an attempt to make sense of the events of the week and the weeks to come. As I looked out of the window I was disappointed not to see a carpet of white snow this morning and realised that it was another day of muddy puddles. It was only a forecast though and the weather feels as uncertain as the delivery of vaccines.

On Wednesday we were told that we will have nearly 1200 Pfizer vaccines coming to Charing on the 2nd February which need to be given at Charing surgery within 5 days. The admin team have been busy inviting those over 70 and those shielding and Charing have been trying hard to adapt their surgery into a building that can function as both a safe vaccination hub and still delivering care to their patients. The practice managers are reacting to really lastminute information to deliver this vaccine.

On Thursday I learnt what a "preposition" was in Libby's year 5 English on-line learning (it is amazing how much primary school work I have to google).

On Friday I learnt that there is a national target to have offered vaccines and administered them to everyone over 70 and those shielding by the 14th February. The rate-limiting step is reliable stock of vaccine but with this target we can hopefully negotiate to get better supplies.

Vaccination hubs:

Having been told that the vaccination program will be GP-led patients are now receiving letters inviting them to vaccination hubs, such as in Folkestone. The admin team have been fielding calls from patients having to decide whether or not to take up the invite. This is a new tactic to try and reduce inequality as some areas have been slower to start vaccinating.

These are genuine invites although I understand that there may be unscrupulous people out there trying to defraud by getting your personal information. The invites might require you to enter some personal information to make the booking but nothing more than is already on the invitation. There will be no need to enter any passport numbers/driving licence details or bank details.

Because we are reacting from one week to the next we cannot book in patients until we know we have the vaccine and then we will call you. By all means book at a vaccination hub and please email us to tell us so we do not invite you to the surgery as well kmccg.woodchurchsurgery@nhs.net. The only time frame I can give is that we aim to have vaccinated all those over 70 years of age and clinically extremely vulnerable (shielding) by 14th February. We then can move on to cohort 5.

Reminder about the cohorts:

- 1 Residents in a care home for older adults and their carers
- 2 All those over 80 and frontline health and social care workers 3 All those over 75
- 4 All those over 70 and clinically extremely vulnerable (shielding)
- 5 All those over 65
- 6 All those between 16 and 65 with underlying health conditions (ie those who would be offered the flu jab)
- All those over 60 7
- All those over 55 8
- 9 All those over 50

It is easy to get caught up with the vaccination program and when I have spoken to a few patients they have apologised for "causing a fuss" when we "must be so busy". I am very grateful for their

considerate comments, however, we do remain open for primary care (GP and nursing stuff). Please do not put off contacting us if you are concerned or are unwell and please don't stop monitoring long term conditions like diabetes and heart disease. If you are taking medication it is important to monitor it as usual to prevent unwanted complications.

Routine appointments at the hospital and new routine referrals have been suspended for the time being but all urgent referrals (such as suspected cancer) are going ahead as usual so please be responsive to new symptoms that may need investigation.

Every vaccine given is a step closer to recovery of our freedom and the economy but please remember to get your flu jabs (we are a bit low on the under 65s with long term conditions), and report new symptoms of concern to us. We look forward to seeing you all and there is no such thing as "a fuss".

throughout. Then a welcome easing of the restrictions in late July and August allowed six (appropriately distanced) people to meet outdoors in a public place or a garden. This enabled us to hold a series of Garden Parties and so, in groups of six, we were finally able to meet up in person, have a good natter and enjoy a cream tea or two in the glorious summer weather - bliss!

Unfortunately, the weather gradually became more autumnal and soon, regretfully, the garden parties became a distant fond memory. In order to alleviate the tedium of the increasingly shorter

and darker days, we set up a raffle and so two lucky members excitedly received a beautiful bouquet and a bottle of wine on their doorstep each month. In addition in December every

member also received a pink Christmas bag containing a box of mint chocolates and - very optimistically - a full and varied programme for 2021! You might reasonably suggest that this was a little unrealistic, particularly in view of our present situation, but with the current good news regarding three possible vaccinations, we felt it was important to be "super ready" to start up again as soon as it is legitimately safe for us to do so. While we have been unable to use the hall at Woodchurch we have been presenting meetings via Zoom on the last Friday of each month.

February 26th - Rebel Star: The Sun's Greatest Mysteries, by Colin Stuart. Colin takes us on a tour of the Sun and outlines what we have learned about it in recent years.

March 26th - The Dark Side, by Stephen Serjeant, Society for Popular Astronomy President. Steve discusses dark matter, dark energy, and gravitational waves.

April 30th - At the Gates of Valhalle, by Andrew Lound. Andrew provides a multimedia presentation about the phenomenon of aurorae, on Earth and other planets.

All meetings are held via Zoom and are free to join. Anyone wishing to attend should email chairman@ashfordastro.org.uk to request the joining details.

We plan to re-open the Gardens at Boldshaves from Monday, 22 March 2021. The Gardens will then be open daily (including weekends and public holidays) from 2-6pm. If you have never heard nightingales in season, do not miss it: over the past 40 years we have lost 90% of our nightingales in this country through ignorance and destruction of their natural habitat. We are fortunate here in Kent to offer some of the UK's last natural nightingale habitat and can therefore appreciate them in all their musical glory.

We are delighted to confirm that we will once again be hosting The Wealden Literary Festival at Boldshaves over the weekend of 26/27 June: see www.wealdenliteraryfestival.co.uk after Easter for programme and other details.

And on Sunday 4 July the Gardens will be open as usual, with all proceeds going to the National Garden Scheme (plus a contribution to a local Kent mental health charity, Kent Minds).

Firstly, the Parish council wish to offer their thanks to the Dr Hickey and his team at Woodchurch Surgery for the stirling work they are doing rolling out the COVID 19 vaccination program in what are, for everyone, extremely challenging times. The Parish council have had numerous reports and feedback of how impressed patients have been with how well organised and efficient the roll out has been, so huge thanks to all who have played their part in this, it is greatly appreciated.

In other news, the PC has been addressing the issue of the bus stop outside of Shirkoak Park. This has been damaged and there have been some delays in making it safe to use again. Immediately prior to the January meeting we were given the go-ahead from our insurers to initiate the repairs, so please bear with us while this work is completed.

Finally, it's wonderful to see so many villagers out and about taking their daily exercise around the village and along the many wonderful countryside paths within the parish, be it muddy in places! As lockdown continues it's consequently important that we all continue to respect other walkers, our natural environment and farm animals by:

- Parking carefully to not block pavements, access to gateways and driveways
- Maintaining the hedges on the boundaries of your property to ensure that pavements and footpaths are clear and passable.
- Leaving countryside gates and property as you find them
- Following paths and giving way to others where it's narrow
- Leaving no trace of your visit by taking all your litter home
- Keeping dogs under effective control, especially near other walkers and sheep in lamb
- Dog poo bag it and bin it (don't leave poo on verges, paths or in bags tied to trees!)
- Following advice and local signs
- Obeying social distancing measures
- Washing your hands
